In DT Year 3 were excited and eager to lend their hand at some sewing. They practised skills like, threading a needle, tying a knot and also had a good go at perfecting their blanket stitch and running stitch. They were absolutely delighted with themselves.

In PHSE we discussed the differences between negative thoughts and feelings and how our thoughts directly influence how we feel. We shared some useful ways in which we can stop negative thoughts from bombarding our minds and were challenged to change some negative thoughts into positive ones.

In Maths, we learnt about decimals, tackling the challenge of forming wholes with tenths and hundredths, as well as mastering the partitioning of decimals. While initially daunting, the children persevered through practice and emerged more confident. Homework assignments mirrored this topic, ensuring reinforcement of newly acquired skills.

Meanwhile, in Design and Technology, Year 4 embarked on constructing their cars, with a focus on the intricate chassis. Though some found this aspect tricky, we will have to wrap it up next week, ensuring every student grasps the concept. In Computing, the exploration of Tinkercad led to the creation of personalized 3D toys, showcasing the children's technological skills. And, as always, Year 4 enjoyed their specialized lessons, this week immersing themselves in French through an engaging online quiz.



Overall, it's been a truly fantastic week of learning and discovery.

YEAR 5

The sunshine kept spirits high in Year 5.

In English, we solidified reading comprehension skills by understanding the meanings of tricky words in the context of a sentence. In addition, children researched the class system on board the Titanic and prepared a report using various literary features.

In maths, the children emerged with confidence and tackled various word problem questions in groups; some children even reached the more advanced questions!

In science, we compared reproduction cycles in mammals and plants and designed informative posters to compare living organisms. In computing, year 5 finally finished filming their projects. They used the EyeJack app to add elements of VR to add images or overlays of text. In R.E. we covered stories of the New Testament and how Jesus spread his message to his followers through parables, thinking about the valuable life lessons that Christians may apply in their lives. In D.T., we focused on design over technology, creating designs for denim jackets. We drew inspiration from the latest fashion trends and the possibilities offered by use of colourful patterns. Meanwhile, in mathematics, we looked at statistics and practiced analysing data and creating pie charts.

We explored the impacts of global warming in geography, focusing on topics such as droughts and rising sea levels. This crossed over neatly with science, where we considered plant variations with particular emphasis on adaptation to desert habitats.
